- Any other important details you decide to include.

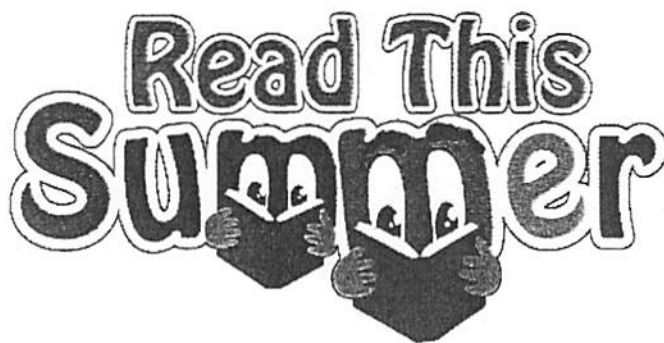
Poster

Summer Science 3rd Grade

Why do some animals live in groups?

Wherever you are this summer there will be animals around. Your challenge is to find a group of animals that live and work together to benefit the individuals or the group. (Ex. Zebras herd together to confuse predators with their stripes...I know, we don't have zebras in Tennessee:) Some species in our local area that you may find are: bees, geese, ants, termites...there are many more.

Procedures

1. Locate an animal group wherever you are this summer.
2. Observe this group over days and/or weeks at different times.
3. Record your observations and **required inquiries** (see below) on white 8 x 11 paper with neat drawings or pictures and labels. Color neatly if you want.
4. Write a summary paragraph on a separate sheet of paper that explains how your chosen animal group benefits from living together and analyze your observations. Your name should be in the top right and animal's name and location should be on the top line.

REQUIRED INQUIRIES

- Is there an noticeable **hierarchy** within the group or is there an equality amongst individuals?
- Are there family groups within the larger group?
- Are there groups by gender?
- Are there groups by age?
- How does the organisms living and working together benefit individuals or the group?

You may not be able to see these observations in one encounter or at all, however, answer each question by what you observe and conclude.

Rising Third Grade

Summer Math

To give students a better understanding of multiplication, I am requiring each rising third grader to memorize every multiple from 2-10. Simply put, I want students to be able to skip count each number's multiples. We will work on memorizing facts during the year.

Number's they will need to know:

2's: 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, 12, 14, 16, 18, 20

3's: 3, 6, 9, 12, 15, 18, 21, 24, 27, 30

4's: 4, 8, 12, 16, 20, 24, 28, 32, 36, 40

5's: 5, 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 35, 40, 45, 50

6's: 6, 12, 18, 24, 30, 36, 42, 48, 54, 60

7's: 7, 14, 21, 28, 35, 42, 49, 56, 63, 70

8's: 8, 16, 24, 32, 40, 48, 56, 64, 72

9's: 9, 18, 27, 36, 45, 54, 63, 72,

10's: 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90, 100

I will be giving the students a small quiz the first week of school. So please take time to study throughout the summer. A YouTube search will pull up many skip counting songs that can be very helpful and fun for memorizing. I look forward to a great year of getting to know your children!
